## Christmas Tree Recycling & Extra Holiday Trash



Burrtec Waste Services will collect your Christmas Tree at curbside after the holiday from December 26<sup>th</sup> through January 8<sup>th</sup>. Simply put your tree out next to your trash containers on your regular collection day. Trees over 6-feet will need to be cut in half. Please remove all ornaments, decorations, tinsel and metal stands off the tree. Flocked or fire retardant trees will not be accepted this year. Approximately 80% of holiday trash is recyclable. All gift boxes, wrapping paper, greeting cards and cardboard packaging are items that may be placed in the recycling barrel. Burrtec will collect excess holiday trash and recyclables beginning

December 26<sup>th</sup> through January 8<sup>th</sup>. Residents may place excess holiday trash/recyclables in bags alongside their containers on collection day free of charge.





## LASD Deputy Spotlight—Meet Daytime Deputy Lambert

My name is Joshua Lambert. I have been serving in the capacity of Deputy Sheriff for the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department for just over 10 years. I have had a wonderful and very blessed career, and it has been my dream to be a Deputy Sheriff since I was a young child. My career began in November of 2006, upon completing the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Academy at the Sheriff's Training and Resource Services Center in Whittier, Ca. My first assignment was working custody at Men's Central Jail. It was definitely an eye-opening experience. I learned much about the human condition, and also the criminal element. While working Men's Central Jail, I worked many different assignments, from the jail hospital, general population, and also in the section of the jail where some of the most dangerous inmates in Los Angeles County are housed. I was also able to work as a Training Officer, and trained newly hired Academy graduates, which was not only a challenge, but an absolute pleasure. I was also assigned to the Sheriff's Response Team, which is a special unit that handles civil unrest. I received great training on tactical responses to civil unrest and riot-type situations.

In 2009, I worked Transportation Bureau, where I drove buses and transported inmates to and from courts all over the county. I am glad I transferred to the Transportation Bureau because it allowed me see and learn a different aspect of the Department. I also worked with more seasoned deputies who worked many different areas of the Department, such as Patrol, Detective Bureau, the Background Investigation Unit, and the Special Victim's Bureau. Getting to know these seasoned deputies, and talking to them about their experiences, better prepared me for a career in patrol.

In February of 2014, I finally transferred to my preferred patrol station, Temple Station. This was a very exciting time for me, because after anxiously awaiting my turn to go to patrol, my time had finally arrived. I was excited and ready to learn one of the most challenging, yet rewarding positions with the Department. My patrol training experience was amazing. I had two very seasoned and knowledgeable training officers who trained me very well. Once I passed my patrol training, I was assigned to work areas such as South El Monte and Rosemead. I learned a lot very fast working in these areas.

Approximately 6 months after completing my patrol training, I was asked to work patrol in the cities of Duarte and Bradbury, and I gladly accepted. Working patrol in the cities of Duarte and Bradbury has been a lot of fun for me. I have a group of exceptional partners who I work with, which makes the job a lot of fun. One of the things I like the most about working in this area is the people I encounter. The citizens of Duarte and Bradbury truly support us and play an active role in what we are doing. I have always had what I call a "servant heart." I really enjoy serving our citizens, listening to

## COMMUNITY SCOPING MEETING: OAK VIEW ESTATES

Please join the Bradbury Planning Commission City staff and environmental consultants from Michael Baker International on December 7th at 6:00pm at Bradbury Civic Center for an informational session about the proposed Oak View estates development. This project is referencing Tentative Tract Map 73567, Oak View Estates Specific Plan. The proposed Oak View Estates Specific Plan would create five (5) estate residential parcels, a private park, and a water tank oriented around a new private residential street that would loop from Bliss Canyon Road on the east to Long Canyon Road on the west. The Project would also preserve approximately 157 acres in a permanent conservation easement. The City will hold a scoping meeting for the above referenced project to receive comments on the scope and content of the environmental documents to be prepared under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). You are welcome to attend the scoping meeting and present environmental information that you believe should be considered. 

As we gather with friends and family to celebrate the holidays, the Pasadena Humane Society & SPCA hopes that the following tips will help you and your pet have a healthy, happy and enjoyable holiday season and a wonderful new year.

- Skip the leftovers and stock up on special holiday pet treats. Providing your pet with a dog or cat treat will help avoid and indigestion due to dietary changes.
- Bones can tear up or obstruct your pet's digestive system. Cooked turkey bones can easily splinter.
- Crowds and holiday festivities may frighten some animals. If your pet does not like loud noise and large groups of people, set aside a safe and quiet place as a retreat.
- Choose holiday floral arrangements with your pet in mind. Common Yuletide plants such as poinsettias, mistletoe, ivy, and holly berries can be poisonous to cats and dogs. Lilies are highly toxic, and often fatal, to cats. Safe alternatives can include artificial flowers made from silk or plastic.
- Secure your tree to the wall or ceiling, away from furniture that can serve as a springboard for your pet.
- Try to keep ornaments high on the tree, away from curious pets. Replace tinsel and garland with velvet bows or ribbons.
- While So Cal winters are usually mild, remember to provide your pets with a warm place to sleep when temperatures drop.
- You may want to keep your dog's coat longer in the cooler months or get your pet a sweater for added warmth.
